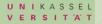

### List of relevant European teaching contents

During the first step of the project a comprehensive list was developed in cooperative work of all six partners. As a result the "list of relevant European teaching contents" within the profession of landscape architecture was published. The complete list can be found and downloaded at:

The list is based on a draft document prepared by ECLAS-LE:NOTRE "Tuning Landscape Architecture Education in Europe" in which the different fields of landscape architecture are already defined. At this first step it was enhanced with a focus on European coherence. However, also international regulations (e. g. CBD) were accounted. Finally a list of 118 different aspects in six fields was elaborated.

#### Analysis of offered European teaching contents

The aim of step two was to get a general idea of the status quo of todays teaching offers at European universities.

EFLA contacted their members throughout Europe to incorporate knowledge of practicing professionals.

All aspects of the list were evaluated regarding their value for the bachelor and the master level as well as their degree of implementation in the current curicula of universities. These evaluations were completed independently by both parties - universities and practicing landscape architects. The analysis shows deficiencies in the teaching offers which could lead to future disadvantages of relevant European guidelines and their pratical implementation in projects.

#### Recommendations for a European teaching cluster

Based on the analysis of the "list of relevant European teaching contents" in step two, the EU-teach project ends with recomendations for a future, european wide teaching cluster. Serving as an example of how to compete with the increasing amount of requirements for universities as well as students.

With this cluster, universities could focus on their core competences and additionally offer students courses at a high professional level all over Europe, to ensure that students become experts in areas of their special interest (in a European context).

In the next step, a framework should be established for a European wide, comprehensive and coordinated teaching cluster for landscape architecture and it's associated profession students.
